



#### **MEASURES OF SUCCESS**

Six measures of success are evaluated upon a family's exit from Saranam. In 2011, 8 families exited the program.

#### HOUSING

6 adults/5 families moved into their own housing

#### **DUCATION**

6 adults/5 families improved their education while in Saranam and 4 adults/4 families continued in school upon exit

#### EMPLOYMENT

3 adults/3 families were employed upon exit

#### LIFE SKILLS MANAGEMENT

5 adults/5 families improved their life skills

#### PARENTING

5 adults/5 families improved their parenting skills

#### MAJOR BARRIERS ADDRESSED

4 adults/3 families addressed their major barriers while in the program

Since inception in February 2004, Saranam has opened its doors to 51 of Albuquerque's homeless families, including 61 adults and 104 children. Of the families that have left the program, 73% were in housing at the time of exit or have later reported to Saranam that they are housed. We have educated/are educating 61 adult residents with life skills training and adult basic education.

# FACTS ABOUT HOMELESSNESS

- > Homeless families comprise roughly 1/3 of the total homeless population.
- > One in every 45 children experiences homelessness in America each year. That is 1.6 million children each year.
- > In 2010, over 16,000 children were homeless in New Mexico.
- > New Mexico ranks 45th in child homelessness in America.
- > Children experienceing homelessness are sick four times more often than other children.
- > In the past five years (2007-2012), the number of homeless students attending Albuquerque Public Schools has doubled from 3,428 in 2007 to over 7,000 in 2012.
- > Extended homelessness has been shown to lead to early death at an average age of between 42 and 52, due to many untreated chronic health conditions as well as the hardship of living outdoors.
- > The National Low Income Housing
  Coalition's study "Out of Reach 2010"
  explains that an average two-bedroom
  apartment in Albuquerque rents for \$782/
  month. In order to afford rent, a wage
  worker must make at least \$15.04/hour.
  However, minimum wage in Albuquerque is
  \$7.50/hour, and the average (mean) wage
  for a worker is \$11.52/hour.



Saranam addresses this wage disparity by increasing the education and skill level of homeless families, thus increasing their earning potential and empowering them to remain self-sufficient.







#### SARANAM PROGRAM SERVICES

#### HOUSING

Each family is provided a furnished apartment, a home that provides stability. All families are located in the same apartment complex, encouraging the formation of community.

#### ADULT BASIC EDUCATION AND LIFE SKILLS

In the first phase of the program, adults participate in adult basic education and life skills training courses provided by CNM Workforce Training Center and taught on the Saranam campus. Some topics include GED, computer skills, parenting, financial management, nutrition, health and hygiene, communication, domestic violence education, drug and alcohol education, and vocational skills training.

#### **VOCATIONAL EDUCATION**

Following basic education, adults pursue education from a community college or university. Obtaining a certificate in a trade allows for more employment opportunities and increases earning potential. Saranam provides some scholarship money as well as assistance in attaining other monies for vocational training.

#### CASE MANAGEMENT

Families are provided with intensive support and advocacy from their case manager. Referrals are made for health, mental health and other needed services. Accountability is an important piece of the transition out of homelessness.

#### **TRANSPORTATION**

Monthly bus passes or a gas stipend is provided each family during their stay at Saranam.

#### **COMMUNITY EVENTS**

Saranam provides and arranges regular community events to help connect our families to each other and to the larger community.

#### CHILD CARE

Saranam covers child care expenses and before/after school care expenses that are not otherwise provided for. Child care plays an important role in the stability of the children and the success of the adults who are in school and in the workforce.

# △Housing



SARANAM IS A REFUGE from homelessness. We provide our families with this refuge by housing them in a safe, fully furnished apartment. Studies show that until a family has a stable housing situation, they are unable to move forward in other areas of their lives, such as education and employment. This is true for the children as well as the adults in homeless families.

Saranam's families live in the same apartment complex which allows them to immediately become members of an established community. Our families learn to live together, care for their shared living environment together, work through conflicts together, and most importantly, learn to support each other. This platform of a safe, stable housing community supports Saranam families as they begin to move forward in their education, parenting, and community participation.

# **a**Education

SARANAM BELIEVES EDUCATION is vital to ensure a successful transition out of the cycle of homelessness and poverty. Research shows that income goes up as educational attainment increases. Annual income nearly doubles for someone with some college over someone who doesn't have a high school diploma/GED. By emphasizing the value of education and providing students opportunities to choose their vocational path, we provide access to improved employment opportunities, stabilization of housing and the means for our parents to succeed.

Saranam provides a full semester of on-site classes to prepare students for success in college courses. Adults are prohibited from working so that they can be full-time students, focusing on furthering their education. Saranam also provides a year of life skills courses that teach how values, choices and behaviors affect not only the individual but also families, employers, and the community. These life skills are crucial for success and provide the skills often lacking in homeless families.

#### **SARANAM EDUCATION 2011**

## Number of Adults Receiving Adult Basic Education 8

Adult Basic Education (ABE) includes a broad assessment of current academic skills, GED preparation classes, and individualized academic instruction for those students possessing a GED or high school diploma. Classes are taught at Saranam by CNM Workforce Training Center instructors four half-days during the fall semester. These classes are required for all Saranam adults during their first semester in our program. Of families accepted to Saranam in 2011, one adult had completed some college and did not take an initial assessment. The remaining seven students initially tested at an average of seventh grade in reading, and 6th grade in math and language. Two who needed a GED passed after four months of classes. All students enrolled in college classes after one semester of Adult Basic Education.

# Number of Adults Receiving Vocational Training 16

After completing the first full semester of on-site classes at Saranam (Life Skills and ABE), students are required to enroll part-time in an off-site vocational training program at a school of the student's choice. All 16 students enrolled at CNM. All Saranam adults are required to continue with their vocational training until their course of study is completed and/or a transition plan for exiting Saranam is in place.

## Number of Adults Receiving Life Skills 16

Life skills courses include parenting, nutrition, financial management training, domestic violence awareness, safety, health and sex education, drug and alcohol prevention, home maintenance, values and communication and vocational skills training. They are taught in the Saranam classroom by Central New Mexico Community College Workforce Training Center. Saranam adult participants attend four half days for fall and spring semesters and one morning per week during the summer semester. These courses are required for all Saranam adults during their first year in the program.

Through life skills training, weekly Community Speakers gave educational presentations for the Saranam students on these topics.
