Tesia's Story

You don't need a lightbulb when Tesia is in the room; she positively glows with excitement.

Tesia is elated to be following dreams that she did not think she would ever have the chance to pursue. For her, Saranam is more than a solution to homelessness, it is a prime opportunity that she is not going to let pass her by.

"I'm so grateful. I've never had the time to work to better myself before. I've always had to work. Work, work, work. And now I finally get to finish my education."

Tesia is a small-town girl at heart, growing up in a rural community in New Mexico where she loved watching horses canter down the street, greeting neighbors at the store and exploring the vast land surrounding her. She left high school on the brink of graduation and worked tirelessly to keep her family afloat before moving up to Albuquerque with her three children to live with her mother.

Though they were housed, their circumstances teetered on the edge, and when an illness forced her mother to return to her hometown and the landlord refused to reissue a lease in her name, she was faced with eviction. Frantic, she called Saranam.

The support and calm of the staff instantly soothed her and she was elated when she was accepted into the program.





"Saranam has helped me find a purpose in life."

"I've never been chosen for anything before and you guys chose me. You chose me to let me better my life."

Still, having always made her own way, she was nervous about letting go of the reins and trusting Saranam to support her family. Her fears were quickly replaced with overwhelming relief when she walked into her apartment, equipped with everything her family needed, right down to the shower curtain that was the exact replica of the one that hangs in her grandmother's bathroom. It felt like home.

She sensed a weight lifted off her shoulders knowing that her family would have a place to eat dinner together and play the games they loved. Right away she surprised herself with how well her family could get by with what Saranam provided.

"It was scary at first, having to budget, and I didn't think I could make it. But I CAN!"

With the burden of survival relieved, she is ready to focus on something she's been waiting a long time for her next step. After a semester of classes at Saranam, she has almost completed her GED requirements and is excited to pursue a career in the hustle and bustle of emergency medicine. She hopes to have her grandparents at her graduation, seeing her achieve the goal they always knew she was capable of.

Tesia knows finishing school will not only set her up for a better job but will also set an example for her kids. It has been an adjustment to go back to school after nearly two decades away, but she is hungry to learn and feels inspired by the direction her life is now heading.

The support that has held her from the first day she called Saranam has continued to reassure and guide her through the hard days. She has never looked back from her first day here.

"It was the best decision I've ever made in my life."

As goals get checked off one by one, her self-confidence blooms. With every passing week at Saranam, she is stepping into her own light.



COST SAVINGS TO THE COMMUNITY

A cost analysis study conducted in 2022 at UNM's School of Public Administration found:

- The estimated annual cost of a family experiencing homelessness to the City of Albuquerque and affiliated organizations is \$110,834. Saranam serves a whole family annually for \$47,190.
- Last year Saranam served 26 families, which is a savings to our community of more than \$1.65 million dollars.
- The estimated annual cost per person experiencing homelessness to the City of Albuquerque and affiliated organizations is \$42,628. Saranam serves a person annually for \$13,942.
- Last year Saranam served 88 people, which is a savings to our community of more than \$2.5 million dollars.

IN ADDITION to the increased earning potential, individuals with a high school diploma saw a 2% decrease in unemployment rates, and the unemployment rate decreased an additional 1.6% for those individuals possessing an associate degree.







Data matters to us!

As part of the process for validating our unique model, we have undergone substantial evaluation and updates to our internal systems. This year, with continued support from the Carl C. Anderson Sr. and Mary Jo Anderson Charitable Foundation, Saranam continued work with the UNM Evaluation Lab.

In our third year of four we explored options for assessing long-term outcomes for Saranam families. The gold standard for assessing program outcomes is to conduct a randomized controlled trial (RCT). Before designing an RCT, a program should demonstrate a high rate of program completion and improved outcomes for participants relative to a welldesigned control group. We measured program completion rates, which showed that 88% of families stayed with Saranam for one semester or longer and 67% stayed with Saranam for 2 semesters or longer. We estimated long-term outcomes from Saranam's ongoing alumni survery. This showed families were better off three years after exiting Saranam than the control group (Family Options Study). We also explored APS McKinney-Vento as a source of data for long-term outcomes.

We hope to continue to move toward the RCT in the coming years to validate and replicate the Saranam model.

We have a position dedicated to data. Data helps us continually evaluate program effectiveness to better serve our families.

Four highlights from our Director of Continuous Improvement (DCI):

- 1. Customization and oversight of our social service database provides the ability to better analyze our families' data.
- 2. Our collaboration with UNM's Evaluation Lab year three of four continues to validate and inform our work. (see previous page)
- 3. We have significantly increased the depth and breadth of our internal organizational evaluation capacity through 99 hours of formal training for three staff members in the Summer Institute of UNM's Evaluation Lab.
- 4. We have a team dedicated to addressing continuous improvement in programing, evaluation, data management and insights from program data.

Saranam has served 162 homeless families, including 346 children and 184 adults, during our 19 years in operation. Families successfully exit the Saranam program having met three or more of our measures of success, indicating that they are able to be fully self-sufficient. This includes the ability to pay for their housing, utilities, and other living expenses.

Working with Young Parents of Young Kids has the Multiplier Effect!

There are reasons that this group of young people are called

"opportunity youth." Research from the Aspen Institute shows that parenthood can be a strong motivating factor for young people. The latest neuroscience reveals that the brains of new parents undergo reconstruction, making them more sensitive to experiences and growth. And of course, young parents have young children — who are developing rapidly, learning about relationships, acquiring language, and creating a million new neural connections each second. With two sensitive periods for growth

and learning co-occurring, it makes sense that supports for young parents have a powerful multiplier effect, affecting children and the family in both short and long term.

The Aspen Institute reports that until recently, very few programs addressed this population. Yet again, Saranam has long incorporated aspects of supporting and developing young parents through increased education, educational support, 2Gen approach, and the understanding of a growth-mindset.

HOMELESSNESS ENDS WITH A HOME

Every day parents experiencing homelessness must focus on and plan for where their children will sleep that night, how to keep them safe, how to get them fed. Because they are often on the move and usually lack access to a kitchen, feeding their children means relying on food that does not need to be refrigerated or cooked. The entire family experiences high levels of stress, and often feel unsafe and vulnerable. This is why we start with housing.

Each family is instantly safe. They have control over their immediate environment. They choose who enters their space. They no longer have to worry if their children will be safe while sleeping. They have a stocked refrigerator and working stove – and all the tools they need to cook nutritious meals. They have access to quality schools and childcare, all within walking distance.

Once these basic needs are provided, the adults and children in Saranam can begin to have the time and energy to focus on themselves: their health, their education, their futures.

From their first day, they have a community of families surrounding them. They have other adults to talk to, they watch out for each other's children, and they rely on each other for support.

DID YOU KNOW?

- This summer we engaged 14 decorator teams, consisting of more than 110 Saranam volunteers that worked a total of 1,181 hours preparing apartments for our 11 arriving families.
- Furniture, household basics and decor were collected throughout the year and stored in our warehouse for volunteer decorators to "shop" for the items needed for each apartment.
- > With the help of Lobo Movers and the La Cueva High School Football Team, we were able to move all the furniture from the warehouse to the apartments in one day!
- Apartments are customized for each family based on family size and children's ages. All have at least two beds with bedside tables, two dressers, toys, a couch and coffee table, kitchen table, dishes, small appliances [coffee maker, microwave, etc.] linens, a desk and chair, decorations, and a TV.
- > Volunteer decorator groups spent several weeks setting up the bedrooms, kitchen, bathrooms, and living room in each apartment. They added personal touches that transformed each apartment into a home.
- Baskets of toiletries, paper goods, infant/ toddler items, desk/study supplies, basic tools and cleaning supplies to fully stock each apartment were provided in 2022 by Faith Lutheran, Women with Purpose, Heights First Church of the Nazarene and many individual donors.
- > The day before new families move in, the volunteers shop for groceries to stock refrigerators and pantries.
- Families take their whole home full of furnishings with them when they leave!



EDUCATION BRINGS EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES

Equally important to a stable present is a secure future. Through education, parents grow their potential as providers, problem-solvers, and advocates for their children. Education builds assets. Together with employment, families thrive and poverty becomes a part of their past.

Saranam's classes are part of an integrated curriculum designed to prepare our parents to transition into being college students.

DID YOU KNOW?



lan Vetter Director of Education

Our Director of Education, Ian Vetter, began the process of officially packaging our educational curriculum for replication!

COURSES INCLUDE:

Effective Communication: Life skills are something we learn, not something we are born with. This course explores basic communication principles, the dynamics of interpersonal relationships, and conflict management emphasizing communicating conclusions and convictions clearly, effectively, and ethically in a multicultural and technologically complex society.

Community Resources: This class serves as an opportunity for Saranam students to openly discuss current issues within the community and as a platform for speakers from other community organizations.



Adult Academic and Vocational Education

Saranam's Adult Academic and Vocational Education includes an assessment of current academic skills, GED preparation, and individualized academic instruction for those students who have a GED or high school diploma. In a typical first semester, Saranam offers about 250 hours of academic education. Additionally, Saranam offers 420 hours adult life skills education and 135 hours of family life skills activities. Classes are mandatory for all adults during the first year in our program, unless already enrolled in college level academic courses at an accredited institution.

♦ FALL SEMESTER

Academic and Life Skills at Saranam

The curriculum guides participants to identify higher educational goals, and prepares them to pursue those ambitions. This provides the foundational understanding of topics they will most likely encounter once they are attending college classes in the Spring semester.

♦ SPRING SEMESTER

Life Skills at Saranam and Vocational/Academic classes off-site

The curriculum builds upon Fall semester progress by exploring their capacity to express themselves through presentation. Through self-reflective writing assignments and in-class presentations, Spring semester aims to build confidence in articulating ideas and experiences. These classes are held only in the mornings to allow participants to attend afternoon classes at the accredited institution of their choice.

♦ SUMMER SEMESTER

Life Skills at Saranam and Vocational/Academic classes off-site

The curriculum consists of Employability Skills, offered in the morning once a week. This class provides an overview of important skills needed to attain employment, as well as opportunities to practice those skills. Participants practice resume and portfolio building, job searches, job interviews, and collaborate on team-based research and presentations. As with Spring semester, participants are expected to be enrolled in summer classes at the accredited institution of their choice.

SARANAM'S ADULT LIFE SKILLS

CLASSES are offered throughout the entire first year of the program to help our adults sustain and further develop their roles as parents, community members and potential employees. In a typical year, Saranam offers 420 hours of adult life skills education.

Just as education is key for adult growth and success, at Saranam we know a robust child education component is also needed. Saranam's unique 2-Generational approach focuses our education on both adult and children. Families get what they need to create a legacy of economic stability and overall well-being that passes from one generation to the next.

The importance that a parent's education, economic stability, and overall health has on a child's trajectory is well documented. Likewise, children's education and healthy development inspire and encourage parents to set the entire family on a more secure path.

We work from and towards the needs of both the parent and the child, using research, education, and personal experience to determine what to include, change, or reform in our program.

EDUCATION = INCREASED INCOME

Education is a core component of the Saranam program because it is important for economic stability.

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics reports that individuals with a high school diploma or GED earned, on average, an additional \$9,516 during 2020. Earnings increased by an additional \$4,680 for those individuals with some college experience, with a further \$8,008 increase seen in those who obtained an associate degree.

In addition to the increased earning potential, individuals with a high school diploma saw a 2% decrease in unemployment rates, and the unemployment rate decreased an additional 1% for those individuals possessing an associate degree.



COMMUNITY BUILDS CONNECTIONS

Everybody needs somebody. That's why we bring Saranam families in together once a year. That's why we function in the cohort model. Saranam families live, attend classes, socialize, and grow together. We know that community holds us accountable and provides support. Community makes us stronger.

Community is fun and feels good. We know that community connections and relationships between children and adults help with healthy brain development, improve social capacity and decrease parental stress. We believe that the lack of community support systems is a key underlying cause of homelessness. At Saranam we strive to make sure that relationship building and community are an integral part of every aspect of our program.

We bring an entire class of families into the program at one time and beginning with orientation, we build relationships in a peer group model. Participants move through the two-year program together. Families in our program live in the same apartment complex as neighbors, classmates, and friends.

This intentional community is a unique model for serving families who are experiencing homelessness. Together, families in our program have new opportunities together. They enjoy gardening, cooking, socializing, and learning together at the Weil Family Center, our hub for community and family programming. We believe that the lack of community support systems is a key underlying cause of homelessness.



Alumni Programing





Saranam Provides the Opportunity for Long-Term Family Stability

Saranam's Alumni Programing provides support to families after they have exited the program. Saranam staff and community engage with alumni families to provide emotional support, assistance with navigating through any challenges, and referrals to community or job resources. Saranam holds events for alumni, including educational and community building and continued high-level life skills classes.

By participating in Saranam's alumni programming, our families are continuing the healthy living concepts learned and put into practice while living at Saranam.

- > We have remained in contact with 76% of families who exited one year or more ago – 68 families with 80 individuals – 12 are 2-Gen kids who are now adults and still maintain a relationship with Saranam.
- > This continued contact helps us track post-exit stability and enables us to offer savings accounts (IDAs) for families to help build their financial assets.
- > Of those families, 86%* who left the program successfully remain stable after a year.

We ask families to complete a survey post-exit in order to observe their progress. This allows us to monitor the success of the families after they leave our program, as well as the success of the program itself.



Diversity, Equity & Inclusion

As an organization set apart by our focus on community, we recognize that at its core, community is about belonging. Saranam is a place of belonging.

As residents, our families know that they hold a valued place and that their voices inform and guide our work. As staff, we recognize that the unique contributions of our lived experiences and areas of expertise elevate our work to its highest effectiveness. And as a community, we believe the diversity of backgrounds and perspectives we represent is what make Saranam the vibrant, welcoming place that it is.

Our belonging makes us stronger.

We always want our work to reflect the strength and wisdom of our community. That is why we teamed up with **Fidelity Investments** and **Common Impact** to codify a sustainable DEI strategy to strengthen our organization and the community we serve.

This effort is part of our continual commitment to grow using best practices. We also know that in modeling this to our families, we are inspiring new sprouts of belonging that will grow throughout our community.

Saranam offers two savings programs for our families.

Building assets has a direct correlation to long-term financial stability. Through a partnership with Prosperity Works and Rio Grande Credit Union, Saranam families can establish two types of savings accounts.

IDA Individual Development Accounts

IDAs are matched savings accounts for Saranam alumni interested in saving for a change-making asset like a house, a car, an education, or a business.

 Participants save \$1,000 while attending financial literacy classes which include setting their own goals. After the 4:1 match rate, they have \$5,000 to spend toward their goal.

CSA Child Savings Accounts

Current families are encouraged to enroll each of their minor children in the CSA program. Saranam provides seed money, matches funds (1:1), and incentive funds.

CSAs may be used for any educational expenses (tuition, books, computer, etc.) after high school graduation. Saranam contributes to these accounts for up to five years, giving our families one more reason to keep in touch once they become alumni.

> Research shows that if low to mid-income kids have an educational savings account (even just \$500) they are more likely to attend college. Also, kids with CSAs have parents who are two times as likely to expect them to attend collage.

Jessica's Story

When Jessica successfully completed Saranam's program, she left with a promising career in front of her, a stable home for her family and one of her greatest treasures – an unshakeable village of support. That village had been by her side since the day she entered our doors and hasn't budged since.

"I've never really felt alone since I left Saranam."

Offering the same support she found at Saranam has become her calling as a social worker at S.A.F.E House, the largest domestic violence shelter in the state. She gives domestic violence survivors the same help that she received during the hardest times of her life, reminding them that they are not alone and that hope is possible.

She also uses her knowledge and expertise to give back at Saranam, teaching families about domestic violence and the resources that are available, as well as regularly referring new families to Saranam.

Her goal is that people in her presentations feel empowered, either to seek help so they can safely and confidently leave a dangerous situation, or to help a loved one access resources that could save their life. It is important to her to not only teach the red flags of abuse, but to increase understanding of the origins of trauma to give a new lens for helping survivors of domestic abuse. "I want to do something to contribute because I loved the program and this brought it full circle." "Everybody wants to make a difference and have something good to contribute. I am giving them permission to trust themselves to help others."

More than anything, she wants her presentations to make advocates of everyone she speaks to. Creating a community of advocates bolsters the support system that survivors can rely on and increases their success in leaving an abusive situation.





That feeling of community is one of her most vivid and precious memories of Saranam and is at the top of her priorities when she refers families to us now. The tight-knit community that Saranam provides can be a relief for the intense isolation many survivors have faced. From her own experience, she knows how transformative it is to have a safety net behind you.

She recalls that everyone in her cohort was determined and independent but struggling under the burden of doing everything on their own. Together, they learned to rely on one another. They kept each other accountable and provided an extra push, or an extra hug, when they met a roadblock; by lending their strength to one another, they came up with new answers and fresh solutions.

The friends she made all those years ago are now like sisters and have continued to hold her through the tired days of having new babies, the nerves of big changes and the stress of a global pandemic.

"I met my best friends at Saranam and we're still best friends. If I have moments when I am starting to doubt myself they can tell me, 'I saw what you were capable of when you were at rock bottom, so I know what you're capable of now'."

The sense of belonging Jessica found at Saranam has added a richness to her life that is priceless. She hopes others find that same sustaining camaraderie in their groups.

Jessica's presentations are a favorite among our families. As a successful alumni, a trusted advisor and a knowledgeable presenter, she is a role model for everyone in our program. Her passion is leaving a mark both within our walls and beyond as she grows an army of advocates that will change the landscape of our community.

Tom, long-time local walking and running enthusiast, planned a 50-mile challenge walk across Albuquerque to raise funds and awareness for Saranam. His goal was to raise \$10,000 from donors and local business sponsorships.

"Although I am not a wealthy man, I have a desire to do more to help. I believe Saranam's philosophy to provide a 'leg up', not a 'hand out' in its assistance to families who are homeless is vitally important to our community, our city, and our citizens."

He began his challenge in the small hours of the morning and trekked along his carefully planned route through the city. He completed 46 miles when hot weather, compounded with poor air quality, stopped him just short of his goal.

Though he didn't complete his challenge, an incident occurred that brought his journey full circle: a group of good Samaritans rushed to help when he required medical assistance, and in a serendipitous turn of events, one of them was a former resident of Saranam! She thanked him profusely for his endeavor and told him what a difference Saranam had made in her life. It was a beautiful reminder of the role our work plays in cultivating a caring, compassionate community.

Saranam Scalability Expanding the Work



We have operated at our current 24-unit campus on the east side of Albuquerque since 2005. Every year we are only able to meet a fraction of the demand for our program.

We are building a new 3.5-acre campus on Albuquerque's west side. This second location will provide 25 additional homes for families, more than doubling our capacity. The site will include new classrooms and office space along with playgrounds, gathering spaces, a renovated family center, community gardens, and parking.

The safety, access to essential services, and convenience of transportation to higher education facilities make it an ideal place for families to set down roots.

Our total project campaign goal is \$9.6 million. Thanks to your incredible support, our capital campaign continues to be successful. We are 65 percent of the way to our goal by year end 2022!



Update In February 2022 we broke ground on our ADC Family Campus.

Our expansion, like our families' futures, starts with a solid foundation. Much of this work happens below the surface and takes a long time but is important work. We are so excited to see this campus come to life!

What we have accomplished by year end 2022:

- After a long delay, permits were secured to lay the (literal) groundwork beneath where the new homes will be.
- 2. Weeds, trees, and other plants with deep root systems were removed and surrounding fencing structures repaired.
- 3. We have purchased 16 of the required 39 used APS portables. These buildings will be refurbished to become environmentally friendly, LED certified two and four bedroom homes.
- **4.** The concrete footings necessary to support the homes are being poured and cured aligning with the phases of development.

Coming soon:

- We are working to acquire the remaining portables that will become our homes and program spaces from Albuquerque Public Schools.
- 2. Renovations to our new Family Center will include the addition of two large classrooms upstairs, a demonstration kitchen, a shower, and laundry facilities.
- **3.** Construction of our new Donation Center will give us the additional space for donations and storage.
- 4. Once these larger projects are complete we will begin landscaping, paving, decorating and moving.

Our hope is to bring in our first west side cohort of ten families in Spring 2024.

We appreciate your continued support of our expansion. We are confident in our progress and know, that when it is complete, the ADC Family Campus will be a perfect place for families to set down roots, tend to their families and blossom.
